





Year 7 NAPLAN Reading mean scores












Year 9 NAPLAN Reading mean scores



Year 9 NAPLAN Spelling mean scores




Year 9 NAPLAN Numeracy mean scores




Year 9 NAPLAN Writing mean scores



Discussion: Total enrolments have increased steadily, from 1316 in 2013 to 1919 in 2021. This represents a 45.82% percent increase during that time. This increase has mainly been in the lower secondary area which has continued to rise, after 2015, when year seven students were first enrolled in secondary schools.

Public health issues relating to COVID continue to effect school attendance rates across the state. Mount Lawley SHS attendance for 2021 was 1.9% lower than "like" schools. Aboriginal student attendance at Mount Lawley SHS remains significantly higher than at like schools and WA public schools.

NB: Attendance data for 2020 has now been updated at DoE level and re-calculated in line with COVID events affecting student attendance at schools.


...GIFTED & TALENTED (GAT) LANGUAGES...

Mount Lawley SHS provides a Languages program for Gifted and Talented students. Student selection and entry to this program is via a testing and placement process conducted by the Department of Education. In order to maintain the program, schools with Gifted and Talented programs are required to report on the level of academic achievement by students within this group. To this end, ATAR scores are examined below for the Year 12 (2021) graduating cohort as well as the Year 9 (2021) and Year 7 (2021) cohorts.


GAT STUDENTS - ATAR COMPARISONS - YEAR 12: 2021








NATIONAL SCHOOL OPINION SURVEYS (NSOS): Parents, Students and Teachers 2021

The National School Opinion Surveys are an important source of information, assisting the school in self-reflection and improvement planning. The results are presented to, and discussed with, the school's Executive Team and the School Board as a part of this process.

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING (VET)

Our Vocational Education and Training program (VET) enhances the students' learning by offering an industry recognised qualification and increasing their employability skills. Students commence their qualifications in Year 11 and generally complete them in Year 12.

All our VET teachers hold the Certificate IV in Training and Assessment and have maintained their industry currency. A large number also hold the qualification that they are delivering to the students. The students in our Career Link Program attend school three days per week and on the other two days attend an external training program and work experience. The programs are delivered by a variety of RTO's including North Metropolitan and South Metropolitan TAFE's and private RTO's. The courses that these students attend are generally not available at school and include Pre-apprenticeship and School Based Traineeship programs. Students who complete their VET programs can use their qualification to gain part-time and, in some cases, full-time employment as well as enrol in higher level qualifications at TAFE. The higher-level qualifications can lead to employment and can also be used as a pathway to university

Authority Developed Workplace Learning: A student is enrolled in an ADWPL class if they are engaged in Work Experience in Year 11 & 12. For every 55 hours of verified ADWPL work placement that a student completes, along with the addition of a "Skills Journal", that student is awarded an endorsed unit equivalent to a C grade.










The main focus for our Technologies Learning Area being the whole notion of employer demand for STEM skills and qualifications being high and that this demand will only increase in the future. Our courses provide students with the opportunities to achieve these highly sought-after key STEM skills.
- * The Technologies Learning Area experienced a continued positive increase in the number of students across all the cohorts choosing the wide variety of Technologies elective courses that we have on offer. ROBOTICS
- * The new Spike Prime Lego Robotic Kits continue to be well received by the Year 7 and 8 classes and their course structures and resources were centrally rationalised by experienced specialist teachers.


The aim is always to increase engagement, which then increases attendance and achievement and then satisfaction.
