I continue to receive feedback from parents and caregivers on our performance as a school and as a team of professionals. This week's positive feedback has

MicroBlitz

Continuing on with the theme of feedback: recently a select group of our Bush Ranger Cadets visited Albany to participate in the MicroBlitz launch for 2014. I received a letter from the MicroBlitz Manager complimenting our students on their contribution, describing it as "nothing short of outstanding" as they "instructed 50+ workshop participants on how to collect a soil sample". Subsequent emails from other key UWA staff and former Chief Scientist Lyn Beazley endorsed these comments. Bravo to our students, and to Andrew Paul and Bianca Sciberras

who worked with them on this worthy project.

Independent Public School (IPS) review

On Monday 24 March we will experience the first instalment of our IPS review. This involves three independent reviewers visiting our school to discuss our progress against the Delivery and Performance Agreement and our school business plan. This half day is predominantly about setting the context of our school. The team will meet with some staff, the Board Chairperson and the P & C President. We will provide the reviewers with considerable documentation to take away and read in readiness for the full two day visit that will occur in Week 9.

OLNA

The Online Literacy and Numeracy Assessment (OLNA) testing has been occurring over the past fortnight. Thanks go to all involved, in particular Karen Mortlock who is our OLNA Supervisor, Steve Raphael and Belinda Derby and all of the staff who have accommodated room changes.

I thought that some background to OLNA might be useful for the viewers at home. As part of the new WACE in 2016, students have to demonstrate an acceptable standard of literacy and numeracy. There are a number of ways in which students can meet this requirement. One is through NAPLAN testing in Year 9. Students who have achieved Band 8 (on a scale of 10 bands) in NAPLAN are deemed to have met the literacy and numeracy requirements. Those students who have not are required to sit the OLNA tests. We have been advised that students will have numerous opportunities to sit the OLNA. Currently it is in March and September each year.

What are the key messages for students and their families? Firstly, NAPLAN testing is significant for a further reason now. Achieving Band 8 will mean that students do not have to sit OLNA in Year 10 or subsequent years. Secondly, failure to pass OLNA tests will mean that students will be ineligible to achieve a WACE. There have been cases in the past fortnight where students have been unable to take





up any of the opportunities provided this round to sit the OLNA tests. I encourage families to remind their Year 10 children that these tests are important and that it is in their best interests to perform as well as they possibly can.

Attendance

Our focus on attendance continues. As part of the high standards that we have at Mount Lawley we do expect that students will attend every day (unless ill or there is a very good reason) and that they are punctual. This is also part of preparing students for a world beyond school where there are also expectations about attendance and punctuality. All of the evidence shows us that there is a direct correlation between high attendance and good achievement at school. It is very difficult to ensure that students are afforded exposure to the full extent of curriculum when their attendance is either irregular or interrupted by absences. The recent introduction by the Department of Education of the 'K' code that "identifies students whose parents have taken them on an in-term holiday" is further demonstration of the requirement of schools to be vigilant in monitoring carefully student attendance.

Communication

Our website continues to be updated regularly as is our App. Increasingly we are using these key methods of communicating with our school and wider community.

Year 7 Transition

We continue to work closely with our local intake area parents and caregivers. The Year 6/7 Parent Focus Group meeting was very positive with great discussion and very positive feedback received for the work that we are doing in ensuring that Year 7s will be afforded a supportive and fun secondary experience in 2015. Thank you to all involved, particularly Michael White, Associate Principal of the Middle School, for his meticulous organisation. Parents on the night gave us some great suggestions for additional information that we can incorporate in our presentations on Wednesday 26 and Thursday 27 March in the lecture theatre at ECU. I look forward to seeing you there.



Middle – Reviewing Your Notes Senior – Reviewing Your Notes These articles are to be used with the School Diary which has been supplied by the P & C Association

- A willingness to investigate further summarising techniques and a positive growth mindset to review their notes each day, week, month and Term.
- A proactive attitude to use the weekly Habits of Mind and Thinking Tools to strive, thrive and flourish in their living, learning and thinking.

Value for Life - Initiative

Identify three positive behaviours which show Initiative at home, then at school and then in the community.

Wellbeing Focus

Taking accurate and comprehensive notes is an essential component for high level student understanding and achievement. More importantly, these notes have to be reviewed regularly to embed them in students' long term memories.

Following are facts relating to how much the brain retains:

- Should notes not be reviewed within 24 hours, 60% to 80% of the learnt material is forgotten by the brain
- After a month with no reviews, only 3% to 4% is remembered
- When the brain doesn't see learnt material regularly, it doesn't see it as important because there are no patterns and as such 'dumps' it.
- When 50 minutes of learning is not reviewed regularly, it takes 30 to 40 minutes to relearn it why learn it in the first place?

As renowned Polish pianist, Ignace Paderewski, once said, "If I miss one day's practice, I notice it. If I miss two day's practice, the critics notice. If I miss three days practice, the audience notices it."

Whereas when the material is continually revisited, the brain sees it as important because there are patterns. Real learning occurs when students are required to retrieve it regularly through reviewing. An excellent way to review notes is to use the interactive online Learning Curve Thinking Tools to organise the learnt material visibly in students' brains.

Students regularly train for sport and practise their musical instruments to improve their skills and capabilities; the brain is no different.




Not-for-profit Tutoring Centre - Teach Learn Grow
